'Yellow Perch' is part of a series focusing on the Delaware River species that thrive, and also those that are endangered. My work is intended to contribute to public debate about our environment and the questions we all need to confront to sustain it. Through a range of visual media I hope to spark new conversations, by bringing the landscape to life."

"'Ground' is part of a body of artwork centered on the often-over-looked soil that we walk on, harvest from, and excavate. The title 'Ground' originates from the Old English word 'grund', and means foundation or base. These soil works explore afresh the rich surface materials that we take for granted but that are themselves a link between the rock core of the earth and all that lives on it. I want to emphasise the powerful visual impact of the varied colors and textures found in a selection of different local NJ soils."
